Learning intention

Tamariki are learning to think about caring for Tīkapa Moana how they would like the Gulf to be.

Success criteria

Children can discuss at least one idea they have about how they can make a difference.





Background information for teachers:

The Hauraki Gulf Marine Park / Ko te pataka kai o Tīkapa Moana te Moananui a toi was established in February 2000 to protect the natural and historic features of the Hauraki Gulf. The Gulf has plants and wildlife found nowhere else in the world and historic sites of national and global importance.

Hauraki Gulf Marine Park covers an area of more than 1.2 million hectares. There are more than 50 islands within the park, many of which are public conservation lands managed by DOC.

The marine park lies on the east coast of the Auckland and Waikato regions, and includes the Waitemata Harbour, Firth of Thames and eastern coastline of the Coromandel Peninsula.

LESSON PLAN Making a difference

Teachers are encouraged to choose and adjust activities to suit the learning needs and interests of their tamariki.



• Watch this Young Ocean Explorers video - <u>Hope stories - harakeke rope</u> to see how one group of children and adults are making a difference.

Video is 5:46 minutes





- Explore more Young Ocean Explorer videos of people making a difference.
- **Think and Discuss** What is one thing that you want to do to help the moana / sea? Is there a sea creature you care about that you want to help protect? Is there a problem that you can see that you want to change / raise awareness of? Make a list as a class.
- **Problem Solving** Here is a <u>simple video</u> showing you some problemsolving steps. Remember – some of the problems in the ocean are big and you might need help. Make a list of many possible ideas for solutions that could help with the problem you have identified in the moana. Think through the solution ideas – which one do you think would work best? *Video is 4:49 minutes*







• Go outside and pick up at least 1 piece of plastic or other rubbish – make a difference in YOUR community. Log your rubbish data on the

<u>21 day challenge graph.</u>

- **Create** a way to share your ideas and get others involved. Try making a video, a poster, a slideshow, a speech, talking or writing to a local newspaper, writing to a member of parliament. There are many ways that you can encourage others to take care of the moana too!
- **Take action** go and make your ideas happen! You may need to talk to others for help and advice. Make a start and keep going!



SUGGESTIONS ON HOW TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE

- Here are some suggestions of how you could make a difference, but you might have other ideas too.
 - Keep picking up at least one piece of rubbish every day.
 - Encourage your family to pick up at least 1 piece of rubbish a day.
 - Join a group who cares for your local environment.
 - <u>Go snorkelling</u> and see what is in the moana near you.
 - <u>Marine Metre squared</u> look carefully to see what lives at a beach near you.
 - Think before you take if you are out fishing or gathering kaimoana make sure you only take what you need.
 - Write a letter to your local council about your ideas for the future of your area.
 - Create a video to share your ideas and raise awareness
 - Get together with friends and plan how you could make a start on your plan for a thriving moana.
 - ENJOY the beaches, lakes, rivers, and the ocean, and appreciate what an amazing place we have worth caring for!
